Language Area

This month we will continue to work with the language letter sandbox and spelling. For Bo Po Mo Fo (ㄅ ㄆ ㄇ ㄈ), we will work with ㄅ ㄆ ㄇ and ㄈ and will spend more time with pinyin. We are learning the Chinese characters 又、身、体、脚、手、大、耳、鼻、目、and 腿. We will read the Chinese poem 枫桥夜泊. The English classroom will work with the sounds for Qq, Rr, Ss, and Tt. Older children will be working with Blue materials (dr. pr. ck. th) spelling and phonics. The English poem is Little Miss Muffet.

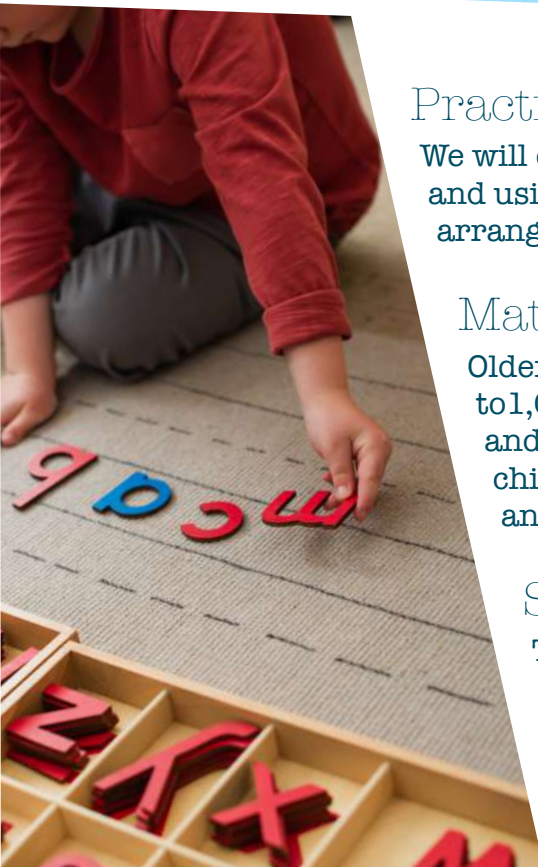

Practical Life Area

We will continue work on sorting objects with small spoons, pouring work, and using the big sponge. We will also introduce wood polishing and flower arranging.

Math Area

Older children will continue work with bank games, and stamp games (1 to 1,000). They will also learn tens and hundreds addition, multiplication and subtraction, including carrying and borrowing. For younger children, we will work on counting 1-9, tracing numbers, spindle box and numbers with dots.
